Northern Michigan Opioid Response Consortium (NMORC)



<u>Mission</u>: To engage Northern Michigan in a coordinated response to reduce substance use disorders (SUD).

Northern Michigan Opioid Response Consortium (NMORC) brings together many partners to address the opioid epidemic across a 25-county region in northern Lower Michigan. Partners include healthcare facilities (hospitals, hospital affiliated clinics, Rural Health Clinics, and Federally Qualified Health Centers), Community Mental Health agencies, Local Public Health agencies, prevention and harm reduction organizations, counseling centers, treatment centers, recovery community resources, law enforcement, and EMS.

NMORC utilizes targeted resources to implement core activities through the *Rural Communities Opioid Response Program (RCORP) Grant Funding* opportunity awarded by the Health Resources & Services Administration.

Core Activities:

- **Stigma reduction:** helping change the narrative to recognize substance use disorder (SUD) as a chronic brain disease, not unlike diabetes or cancer. NMORC offers mental health first aid training; integrates the NMSAS (partner organization) Speaker Series into community/healthcare events; provides supplemental funding for Recovery Month events; educates stakeholders and communities to invite the recovery community and support recovery activities; and uniting to build Families Against Narcotics (FAN) chapters.
- Naloxone distribution, training & expansion of access: provides community naloxone administration training; advocates for pharmacist participation in the distribution of free naloxone resources; promotes education in local county jails; supports integration of naloxone into EMS response to overdose and as part of the discharge process from emergency rooms for high-risk patients; distribution of wall-mounted naloxone safety kits for placement in public locations; champions Naloxone in schools.
- Harm reduction activities: educates partners and communities on the benefits of engaging directly with
 people who use drugs to prevent overdose and infectious disease transmission as well as improve the
 physical, mental, and social wellbeing of those served and offer low-threshold options for accessing SUD
 treatment and services.
- **Behavioral Health integration:** provides training on evidence-based approaches to integrating behavioral health services into primary care; advocates for integration of group counseling activities into primary care, education on behavioral health and SUD/OUD billing/coding, documentation and workflows, recruitment of behavioral health professionals to the region.
- Provider trainings: provides local providers education to address: Screening, Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT), addiction science, Adverse Childhood Experiences, pain management alternatives, DATA 2000 Waiver Trainings, pathways to recovery, stigma, harm reduction, and preexposure prophylaxis.
- Workforce: provides technical assistance for National Health Service Corps (NHSC), Michigan State Loan Repayment Program (MSLRP) and 3RNet. Advocates for increasing recovery professional pathway careers.
- Building recovery capital: develop recovery support resources; promote youpickrecovery.org; develop
 recovery community organizations; increase number of peer recovery coaches through trainings;
 advocate for integration of peer recovery coaches into healthcare settings by supporting community
 health worker training; increase number of peer recovery coaches affiliates with EMS, Fire & Law
 Enforcement; leadership development for peer recovery coaches to increase involvement in governance
 positions, and develop collegiate recovery networks.
- **NMORC website:** house training materials, county by county support resources.

Benefits of NMORC Membership:

NMORC is a membership-based organization focused on engaging Northern Michigan in a coordinated response to reduce opioid and substance use disorders.
