COVID-19 Single-Dose Vial (SDV) Vaccines Available for Rural Health Clinics

In November 2022, the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 bivalent vaccine for people 12 years of age and older became available to order through the Rural Health Clinic COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Program (RHCVD) program as a single dose vial (SDV).

While the vaccine is still available in multi-dose vials, the single-dose option responds to widespread requests to allow greater flexibility for RHCs that may not have the demand or capacity to store multi-dose vials.

RHCs enrolled in the RHCVD Program can order SDV through the Health Partner Order Portal (HPOP).

If an RHC is not enrolled in the RHCVD Program and wants more information, they can email RHCVaxDistribution@hrsa.gov.

NEW! NARHC Certified Rural Health Clinic Professional (CRHCP) Course

NARHC is offering Directors, Clinic Administrators & other RHC leaders a unique full-spectrum course designed to teach you how to operate a successful Rural Health Clinic. Upon course completion & attainment of an 80% or higher exam score, you will earn a CRHCP certification.

Enrollment*: Begins February 14, 2023. Fill out an online form HERE OR register online February 14th. If you fill out the online form, staff will not register you until the enrollment date. As soon as your payment has been processed, you will receive an email notification with further instructions to access the course.

Cost: NARHC Member \$450/learner, Non-Member \$600/learner

Course Format: The course content is all online with an online proctored final exam. The final exam test window will be April 24-28, 2023.

Length of Course: Approximately 15-20 hours. Most people require 4-6 weeks to complete.

Content: The CRHCP Course consists of 4 modules: Admin & Finance, Billing & Coding, Regulatory Compliance & Quality, and Federal Updates with short pre-tests throughout the first 3 modules. To view the Learning Objectives, Click Here.

Pre-requisites: None.

System Requirements: Course content can be accessed within any browser, however the final exam MUST be taken in Chrome or Edge due to our

proctoring platform capabilities.

Final Exam: The final exam will be an online proctored exam only. It is 100 questions in multiple choice and multiple correct (select all that apply) format. The final exam will be available April 24-28, 2023.

What if I don't Pass the Exam: 1 free re-take of the test will be allowed within the first 60 days (on-line). If you do not pass the exam on the 2nd attempt you will have to re-take the course at full price at the next course offering.



Preparing for the end of the Public Health Emergency with the Upper Midwest Telehealth Resource Center Update

On Monday, January 30th, the Biden administration announced that it would terminate the COVID-19 public health emergency on May 11th, 2023.

Although this will not have immediate implications on many of the waivers for telehealth introduced during the COVID-19 PHE, there are two waivers that will immediately go away. These include HIPPA relaxations during the pandemic and the prescription of a controlled substance.



Now Accepting Applications for the Nurse Corps Loan Repayment Program

Would you like help to pay off your loans? The Nurse Corps Loan Repayment Program provides loan repayment to nurses in exchange for a minimum two-year full-time service commitment, at an eligible healthcare facility with a critical shortage of nurses or an eligible school of nursing.

Are You Eligible?

- You must be:
 - A licensed registered nurse
 - An advanced practice registered nurse, such as a nurse practitioner; or Nurse faculty member
- You received your nursing education from an accredited school of nursing located in a U.S. state or territory.
- You work full-time in either:
 - An eligible critical shortage facility in a high-need area or
 - An eligible school of nursing

MDHHS Releases Final MMP-23-08 Bulletin

The final MMP 23-08 bulletin was recently released to notify providers of CPT and HCPCS

code changes being implemented by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS).

Effective dates are identified for each topic area. Note that this notice is distributed to a broad range of providers and not all, or any, of the codes listed, may apply to their scope of practice.

Refer to HCPCS code books and the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) website (www.cms.hhs.gov) for full descriptions of codes. Information regarding fee screens is maintained on the appropriate database or professional fee schedule on the MDHHS website at www.michigan.gov/medicaidproviders >> Billing and Reimbursement >> Provider Specific Information.

Additional pertinent coverage parameters, such as age restrictions, prior authorization (PA) requirements, and other billing indicators, are accessible via the Medicaid Code and Rate Reference tool within the Community Health Automated Medicaid Processing System (CHAMPS) at https://sso.state.mi.us >> External Links >> Medicaid Code and Rate Reference.

National Rural Health Resource Center Launches New Website, Unveils New Branding

The National Rural Health Resource Center, the leading technical assistance and knowledge center focused on rural health, has launched a newly designed website that offers a fresh, modern look and promises an improved user experience to visitors from hospitals, clinics, state and federal agencies, and others. The new site is part of a larger brand refresh that includes the adoption of an updated logo and other design elements.

The revamped site, which continues to be located at <u>ruralcenter.org</u>, is designed to encourage deeper engagement and continue building on the positive experience thousands of visitors have come to expect from the site. The site features streamlined navigation, a more visually appealing design and layout (including an emphasis on video), and improved user experience.

The website, last redesigned in 2014, includes pages dedicated to The Center's population health services; its four federally-funded programs that provide assistance to the nation's rural hospitals,

clinics, State Offices of Rural Health and other rural stakeholders; and its collections of resources — toolkits, guides, webinars and other materials — on topics ranging from small rural hospital and clinic finance, and health equity, to population health and quality reporting. Throughout the site, pages were edited for conciseness and increased use of visual elements like photographs, videos and pull quotes.

The Center's new brand identity elements — an updated logo and brand colors — are also visible on the site. The graphical components of the new logo — abstract icons that depict a landscape with a crossroads in the foreground, signifying togetherness and collaboration, and a rising sun in the horizon, conveying positivity and possibilities —, as well as new brand colors, are incorporated on most of the site's pages.

The site redesign and brand refresh are the result of more than six months of work — including audience research, listening sessions, a communications audit, and a technical audit — led by an outside design firm.

"Our refreshed site and new logo represent important milestones for The Center," said Center CEO Sally Buck. "While our old website served its purpose, we knew that we needed to make our site easier to navigate so that visitors can more quickly find the answers to their questions and the resources they're looking for and more easily connect with our team. We want our stakeholders — whether they're staff at hospitals or clinics, state rural health programs, federal and state partners, or others working in the rural health field — to have a first-class experience when visiting our site."
