The Michigan Center for Rural Health, in partnership with Stratis Health—a leader in community-based palliative care programs—invites rural communities to apply for the *Cultivating Comfort: Enhancing Palliative Care in Rural Michigan* project. This two-year learning and planning initiative aims to help communities establish or strengthen palliative care services. The project will run from January 2025 through December 2026.

Eligible applicants must form multi-site, interdisciplinary teams, which may include representatives from hospitals, clinics, home health agencies, nursing homes, hospice programs, tribal health organizations, and other key stakeholders. Up to five

rural communities in Michigan will be selected to participate, with funding provided by the Michigan Health Endowment Fund.

A designated organization must apply on behalf of the community team, demonstrating a clear commitment from all participating providers and organizations. While there is no fee to participate, selected teams must dedicate staff and resources to the initiative.

We encourage communities ready to enhance palliative care services to take advantage of this opportunity. Join us in strengthening care for rural Michigan—applications are open now, and selected communities will be announced on March 14, 2025.

## Exciting Mini-Grant Opportunities for Improving Health in Rural Communities



The American Heart Association is proud to announce two mini-grant programs designed to foster healthier lives in the rural Midwest. These grants are tailored to address pressing health challenges, from managing chronic diseases to tackling social drivers of health in innovative and sustainable ways.

The Blood Pressure & Beyond Mini-Grant offers up to \$2,000 to healthcare organizations for implementing evidence-based policies and practices that enhance chronic disease management. Applicants can use the funding to adopt new blood pressure measurement practices, develop collaborations addressing social drivers of health, or create innovative workflows connecting patients to community resources like nutrition assistance or blood pressure self-monitoring.

The Meeting People Where They Are Mini-Grant provides up to \$1,500 for community-based organizations committed to improving health in trusted local spaces, such as libraries, food pantries, and community centers. Projects may include empowering residents to monitor their own blood pressure, enhancing access to nutritious food, or improving cardiac emergency response planning.

Don't miss this chance to secure funding that supports impactful and sustainable health improvements in rural communities.

Applications for both grants are due soon.

Office for the Advancement of Telehealth Policy Update



Recent legislation authorized an extension of many of the Medicare telehealth flexibilities. This includes:

- Waiving geographic and originating site requirements through March 31, 2025.
- Expanding practitioners eligible to furnish telehealth services through March 31, 2025.
- Allowing Federally Qualified Health Centers and Rural Health Clinics to serve as distant site providers through March 31, 2025.
- Delaying in-person requirements for tele-mental health services through April 1, 2025.
- Allowing audio-only telehealth through March 31, 2025.

Other recent updates include Medicare telehealth policies in the Calendar Year 2025 Physician Fee Schedule and a temporary extension for prescribing controlled substances via telehealth.

### 2025 Michigan State Loan Repayment Program Application Cycle Begins



The Michigan State Loan Repayment Program (MSLRP) helps employers recruit and retain primary medical, dental, and mental healthcare providers by providing loan repayment to those entering into MSLRP service obligations. MSLRP service obligations require participants to provide full-time primary healthcare services in Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSA) at not-for-profit health clinics for two years.

MSLRP will assist those selected by providing up to \$300,000 in tax-free funds to repay their educational debt over a period of up to ten years. Participants will enter into consecutive two-year MSLRP service obligations requiring them to remain employed for a minimum of 40 hours per week for no less than 45 weeks per year at eligible nonprofit practice sites providing primary healthcare services to ambulatory populations.


The FY26 MSLRP Application Period begins February 3, 2025 and continues through April 30, 2025 for two-year contracts starting October 1, 2025. Northern Obstetric Service Providers, Genesee County Applicants, and Inpatient Pediatric

Providers including only Psychiatrists, Physician Assistants, and Nurse Practitioners remain the program's top priority this year. Additional eligibility information can be found here.

### Collaborative Interagency Health in All Policies Workgroup Launched

In December, the Health in All Policies Interagency Workgroup relaunched with partners from thirteen departments, including representatives from the Michigan Poverty Task Force and the Racial Disparities Task Force. Health in All Policies is a collaborative approach to improving health outcomes, by integrating health and healthy equity into decision-making and policymaking across sectors. The objective of the workgroup is to foster a shared understanding of health and health equity across departments.



The workgroup convenes departmental leadership who will serve as key advisors on the strategic direction of initiatives and guide the state's adoption of a Health in All Policies approach to policymaking statewide. The workgroup will meet quarterly through 2025 and will focus on aligning departments, engaging interagency partners, and supporting effective collaboration. ## The Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System: Insights into Michigan's Health



Understanding the health and well-being of Michiganders is a cornerstone of creating effective policies and programs to address social determinants of health (SDOH). One of the most valuable tools we use for this purpose is the Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System (BRFSS), an annual survey conducted by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). The BRFSS is the largest, continuously conducted health survey in the world and has been operating in Michigan since 1989. This telephone survey gathers critical data about the health behaviors, chronic conditions, and preventive health practices of adults across the state. The findings help inform decisions that shape public health interventions, programs, and funding allocations, directly impacting Michigan residents.

Data from the BRFSS allows MDHHS and its partners to identify and address the barriers that prevent Michiganders from achieving optimal health. For example, BRFSS data can help inform programs aimed at improving food security, addressing transportation barriers, and increasing access to preventive health services. These efforts align with Michigan's broader strategy to reduce health disparities and promote health equity.

The results of the BRFSS are available to researchers, policymakers, and community organizations through the MDHHS Chronic Disease Epidemiology Unit. These insights can guide the development of targeted initiatives to address community-specific needs.

#### **MBQIP** Data Submission Deadlines

#### Safe Use of Opioids-Concurrent Prescribing Deadline Extension

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) has notified eligible hospitals and critical access hospitals (CAHs) participating in the Hospital Inpatient Quality Reporting (IQR) Program and/or the Medicare Promoting Interoperability Program of a deadline extension. The deadline for the submission of electronic clinical quality measure (eCQM) data for the calendar year (CY) 2024 reporting period, pertaining to the fiscal year (FY) 2026 payment determination, has been extended from Thursday, February 28, 2025, to Friday, March 14, 2025 at 11:59 p.m. Pacific Time (PT).

#### January 31, 2025

Emergency Department Transfer Communication (EDTC) Q4 2024 encounters (10/1/24-12/31/24) is due January 31, 2025. Connect with your State Flex Program for submission process details.

#### February 3, 2025

 Reporting Median time from ED arrival to ED departure (OP-18) Q3 2024 encounters (7/1/24-9/30/24) is due February 3, 2025. Submission is through the HQR Secure Portal-Outpatient. CART version 1.25.0. Outpatient Quality Reporting Specifications version 17.0b. For questions on CART submission and requirement details connect with your State Flex Program.

#### March 1, 2025

• The Antibiotic Stewardship CDC NHSN Annual Facility Survey reflecting CY 2024 activity is due March 1, 2025. Submission is through NHSN.

#### March 14, 2025

Safe Use of Opioids- Concurrent Prescribing CY 2024 encounters is due March 14, 2025.
 Specifications CMS eCQM ID CMS506v6. Submission is through the HQR Secure Portal.
 Note: This measure is not currently being submitted for MBQIP but is available for reporting to CMS.

Designated under Title VII of the Rehabilitation Act, Centers for Independent Living (CILs) have been supporting and empowering individuals with disabilities across the country since 1973. The first CIL in Michigan, the fourth in the nation, was established in Ann Arbor. Today, there are 15 CILs across the state with the mission of removing barriers for people with disabilities and promoting self-sufficiency, as well as creating inclusive and accessible communities.

The independent living philosophy focuses on the fundamental civil rights of all individuals with disabilities, advocating for their autonomy to make personal decisions, exert control over their lives, and experience equal participation and inclusion within society.
