

2022 Michigan Critical Access Hospital Conference Wrap Up

This month, the Michigan Center for Rural Health held its annual Critical Access Hospital Conference at the Park Place Hotel in Traverse City, Michigan.

Over two days, there were lively breakout sessions for CAH CEOs, CFOs, and Quality Managers/CNOs, dynamic presentations from a terrific lineup of speakers, engaging exhibits from 16 sponsorship partners, and a fundraising reception that featured a salute to 25 years of the FLEX grant.



to demonstrate their commitment to building long-term primary care practices in underserved communities designated as Health Professional Shortage Areas (HPSAs).

MSLRP will assist those selected by providing up to \$300,000 in tax-free funds to repay their educational debt over a period of up to ten years of participation. New applicants and current participants compete for consecutive two-year MSLRP agreements requiring them to remain employed for a minimum of 40 hours per week for no less than 45 weeks per year at eligible nonprofit practice sites providing primary healthcare services to ambulatory populations. Providers must remain with the employers who sponsor them during their two-year agreements, and employers must continue to employ the providers they sponsor during their two-year service obligations.

Employers must not use MSLRP payments to offset participants' salaries or other components of their compensation packages. MSLRP payments must be in addition to participants' salaries, which must be based on prevailing rates in their practice areas.

Due to significant program changes starting with this application period, providers and employers are urged to carefully read this update, as well as the entire updated MSLRP website and instructions for all application forms.

Increasing Opioid Use Disorder Treatment Options in Michigan's Upper Peninsula

Providers in rural settings must address unique needs in the effort to increase access to opioid use disorder treatment options. Michigan Opioid Collaborative (MOC) and Helen Newberry Joy Hospital offer insightful perspectives about their work in Michigan's Upper Peninsula.

Reducing stigma about the disease and encouraging physicians to expand care options to include harm reduction methods is at the core of MOC's work. "Some providers believe substance use disorder is a choice and recovery only looks like abstinence without relapses from all substances," says Melissa DeMarse, a behavioral health consultant for the organization serving the UP region. "We have to meet people where they are

Michigan's First RN Apprentice Program Signed Into Effect



The first-ever registered nurse apprentice program in the state of Michigan was signed into effect on Nov. 3 at a ceremony held at Soaring Eagle Casino in Mount Pleasant.

The new program will pave the way for those interested in a nursing career to receive a combination of classroom instruction and practical experience with a nurse mentor as a paid full-time apprentice at **Corewell Health** Ludington Hospital for a less cumbersome pathway to registered nurse licensure.

The entities involved in the RN apprenticeship include West Shore Community College in Scottville, Corewell Health Ludington Hospital, the new name for Spectrum Health Ludington Hospital in Ludington, Michigan Works! and let them decide what recovery looks like to them."

Through a recent collaboration with the Community Foundation, MOC is expanding its work to include emergency departments (ED) at UP hospitals committed to establishing MOUD programs.
