# **BREAKING NEWS! CMS Finalizes 2024 Regulatory Updates**

On November 2nd, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) issued the CY 2024 Medicare Physician Fee Schedule (MPFS) Final Ruleand the CY 2024 Medicare Outpatient Prospective Payment System (OPPS) Final Rule, finalizing several Rural Health Clinic (RHC) specific policy proposals that the National Association of Rural Health Clinics (NARHC) first outlined in July.

In September, NARHC submitted **comments** as to how CMS proposals may impact the RHC community and suggested various changes to ensure that safety net providers can take full advantage of the expanded benefits.

Much of the advocacy was successful, particularly in conveying to CMS that RHCs should be able to bill the general care management code, G0511, more than once per patient per month to capture the full benefits of expanded Remote Patient Monitoring (RPM) flexibilities and other benefits.

MDHHS and MSHDA Launch
"Good Housing = Good Health" Program





The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) and the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) are announcing the official launch of the "Good Housing = Good Health" program, a partnership aimed at promoting housing stabilization and addressing social determinants of health (SDOH) within Michigan communities.

This innovative initiative is part of the MDHHS Social Determinants of Health (SDOH) strategy within Michigan's Roadmap to Healthy Communities, which provides comprehensive solutions to the social drivers of health by looking at factors like housing that impact the health of Michigan residents.

The program also incorporates Michigan's Statewide Housing Plan, which enhances the different factors contributing to housing access in Michigan.

Key objectives of the "Good Housing = Good Health" Program include:

- Increasing housing access: The program will improve housing access for eligible households, particularly those that have been disproportionately impacted by COVID-19.
- Providing education and resources: Educational resources and support will be provided to prevent the loss of housing, ensuring individuals and families have the tools needed to secure and maintain safe and affordable housing.
- Strengthening health and well-being: The program aims to enhance the health and well-being of households facing the highest barriers to securing and maintaining safe, affordable housing.

Tobacco Quitlink Celebrates 20 Years of Helping People Become Tobacco-Free



Tobacco use continues to be the leading cause of preventable death in Michigan. Approximately 70% of all adult smokers report wanting to quit, but fewer than one in 10 succeed in quitting for good without the assistance of coaching and/or nicotine replacement therapy.

The Michigan Tobacco Quitlink is a free and confidential service that offers several different programs designed to help Michiganders quit tobacco based on the level of support needed, including phone and online coaching.

The Michigan Tobacco Quitlink, formerly the Tobacco Quitline, was established in

October 2003 as a pilot project for Upper Peninsula residents. In 2004, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) received a grant to expand the service statewide.

In 2022, 27% of Tobacco Quitlink phone coaching participants quit using tobacco. However, Quitlink enrollees who participated in four or more coaching calls had a quit rate of 34%, illustrating that Quitlink participants who stuck with their program had a better chance of quitting tobacco for good.

Quitlink uses proven strategies that have helped more than 1.5 million people quit tobacco.

## REMINDER: MDHHS Recommends Getting Vaccinated for Flu, COVID-19 and RSV



The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is recommending residents get the flu, COVID-19, and RSV vaccines to protect against respiratory viruses this upcoming season.

Getting vaccinated is critical because flu, COVID-19, and RSV frequently spread at the same time of year. Residents can get their COVID-19 vaccine at the same time as the flu vaccine and RSV vaccine if they are eligible. Vaccinations are safe, effective strategies to protect residents, their families, and communities from illness.

"With the addition of COVID-19 to respiratory illness season during fall and winter, it is important to use tools to prevent getting sick and spreading illness, which includes getting safe and effective vaccines," said Dr. Natasha Bagdasarian, MDHHS chief medical executive. "Flu, COVID-19, and RSV vaccines are available in many convenient locations, from primary care providers to local pharmacies, and you can receive them at the same time."

Most Michigan residents can still get a COVID-19 vaccine for free. For people with health insurance, most plans will cover the COVID-19 vaccine at no cost. Michigan residents who don't have health insurance or have health plans that do

not cover the cost can reach out to a health care provider or local pharmacy participating in the CDC's **Bridge Access Program**, their local health department, or visit **Vaccines.gov** for additional information on ways to obtain a free vaccine.

Children eligible for the Vaccines for Children program also may receive the vaccine from a provider enrolled in that program.

# NHSC Students to Service Loan Repayment Program - Apply by December 7, 2023



The National Health Service Corps (NHSC) Students to Service Loan Repayment Program offers up to \$120,000 in tax-free loan repayment assistance to students in the last year of medical, nursing, or dental school.

In return, participants provide at least three years of service at an NHSC-approved site in a designated Health Professional Shortage Area. For the first time, an additional \$40,000 is available to physicians specializing in obstetrics, gynecology, or family medicine physicians who practice obstetrics regularly, as well as certified nurse midwives.

Apply for the Bill Finerfrock Health Policy Fellowship - Deadline is January 5, 2024



Apply today for the 2024 Bill Finerfrock Health Policy Fellowship. This program is designed for mid-career professionals with experience ranging from billing, coding, office management, and/or clinical care in either the RHC setting or a rural health care system.

Applicants may either be current rural health professionals or have past experience in rural health and are currently pursuing additional education/training. The fellowship is a personal and professional commitment to making further impacts in rural health practice and policy.

The fellowship requires a full-time, in-person commitment for either a 4-week continuous timeframe, or two, 2-week periods in May, June, or July 2024. The selected candidate will reside in Alexandria, Virginia during the fellowship period and work within the NARHC DC Office, Monday-Friday, 9 a.m.-5 p.m.

Lodging and travel expenses will be fully covered by the program, and a \$8,000 stipend will be provided to the fellow directly. Additionally, the selected fellow's employer will receive a \$2,000 stipend to be used as the organization sees fit in gratitude for its support of the fellow's participation in this program.

During the program, the BFHP Fellow will:

- Participate in NARHC advocacy meetings with the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and Capitol Hill staff
- Analyze NARHC educational content for relevancy
- Identify areas of focus for NARHC
- Educate key policymakers on the realities of rural health

The application for the 2024 Bill Finerfrock Health Policy Fellowship Program, along with all supporting materials, is due by January 5, 2024, at 11:59 pm ET. Completed applications should be emailed to **Sarah.Hohman@narhc.org**. Interviews will be conducted in mid-January, and the selected candidate will be notified by mid-February, 2024.
